### **Curriculum Vitae**

Anne Deruyttere, a national of Belgium, has 25 years of wide ranging and relevant policy and hands-on experience at the Inter-American Development Bank (IADB). In her capacity as the Chief of the Indigenous Peoples and Community Development Unit from 1994 to 2007, she was responsible for leading, supervising and providing technical expertise to a team of staff and consultants in developing and implementing IADB standards on indigenous peoples, involuntary resettlement, sustainable development, community participation and sociocultural issues. She was likewise responsible for spearheading the design and execution of cutting-edge projects to address indigenous entrepreneurship and self-directed development. Prior to this, she was IADB's Anthropologist in its Environment Protection Division from 1990 to 1994, and an Operations Evaluation Officer from 1983 to 1990.

She is presently an International Consultant with the World Bank, the International Fund for Agriculture Development (IFAD), the German Technical Cooperation Agency (GTZ), and others, working mostly on portfolio reviews and policy papers related to indigenous peoples' rights, ethnodevelopment and social safeguard issues. She also advises and teaches at the University of Carlos III in Madrid and the University of New Mexico. She started her career as a researcher for the Embassy of Belgium in Mexico then for the Commission of Justice and Peace in Brussels.

Ms. Deruyttere graduated from the Catholic University of Louvain in Belgium, with a Master of Arts Degree in Economics. She received her Master of Science in Social Anthropology from the University of Edinburgh in the United Kingdom. She has written and coordinated more than 30 reports, articles and publications covering sustainable development, involuntary resettlement, indigenous peoples and development issues, among other topics. She is fluent in five languages and was a recipient of several awards and honors from the IADB and other institutions.
